Boi v'Shalom - Come in PeaceAnna Hendrick Karpatkin Benjamin West Bay View Foundation Fellowship 2018



Growing up in New York City, Benjamin attended Stephen Wise Free Synagogue, where she studied weekly, became Bat Mitzvah and attended services with her family. This synagogue had two large and welcoming doorways, which the artist came to recognize as a symbol of community; filled with light, color, and song. A few years later, Benjamin visited the Neue Synagogue in Berlin with her grandmother, which had a reconstructed entry and facade after being destroyed during World War II. The architecture of these buildings left a mark with the artist, shown through her series created at Dieu Donné.

Benjamin began her work in the studio with drawings, which she then hand-cut into mylar stencils. For the building facades, mylars were used for short cotton blowouts as well as to add pigmented linen pulp paints. Benjamin focused on the detailed and rigid outlines of these brick and glass structures, while the interior of the sanctuaries allowed the artist to play with color, letting these patterns tell a story. Using multiple layers of abaca and cotton, Benjamin used numerous stencils to create colorful and delicate portraits of these places of worship.



In October 2018, the week after the attacks on the Tree of Life Congregation in Pittsburgh, Benjamin attended Shabbat services with her family at Stephen Wise. The sanctuary within was filled with community, joining together in words, song and action. At one point in the service, the entire congregation stood and turned towards the doors to the sanctuary in an act of welcoming: Boi v'Shalom, Come in Peace.

Throughout my Fellowship at Dieu Donné, I was exposed to an incredibly wide range of approaches to using hand-made paper. The opportunity to observe and assist in the work being produced in the studios evolved my practice to places I wouldn't have reached without Dieu Donné.

Working with Studio Co-Directors Amy Jacobs and Tatiana Ginsberg was not simply an execution of a fully laid out plan, but a true collaboration. Their expertise and ideas pushed the work in unexpected ways, our choices often reactions to how the fibers themselves were behaving. While my approach has always been one of precision and planning, I felt encouraged to let the paper itself take the lead. Dictating the layering and imagery, the paper acted as another collaborator in the studio.
